



EMERGENCY BROADBAND BENEFIT FACT SHEET

The Emergency Broadband Benefit (EBB) is a temporary <u>program</u> to help households struggling to afford broadband internet service during the COVID-19 pandemic. The FCC program provides:

- Up to \$50/month discount for broadband service;
- Up to \$75/month discount for households on qualifying Tribal lands; and
- A one-time discount of up to \$100 for a laptop, desktop, or tablet computer purchased through a participating provider; household must contribute \$10-\$50 toward purchase price.

The EBB is limited to one monthly service discount and one device discount per household.

Who is Eligible?

A household is eligible if a member of the household meets *one* of the criteria below:

- Has an income that is at or below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines or participates in certain assistance programs, such as SNAP, Medicaid, or <u>Lifeline</u>;
- Receives benefits under the free and reduced-price school lunch program or the school breakfast program, or did so in the 2019-2020 school year;
- Received a federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Experienced a substantial loss of income due to job loss or furlough since February 29, 2020; or
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating broadband provider's existing low-income or COVID-19 program.

Three Ways to Apply
